












CAPTAIN'S CORNER

Seventy and Still Going Strong

Harry E. Watson is smiling broadly these days. He's busy disputing the sad premise that moving through the life span is mainly travail. In March, 1992, Harry skied Run #8 in Breckenridge, Colorado, jumping the gun on free lift privileges before he became seventy years of age.

April 12, 1992 found Harry up early and running the Newport Beach Back Bay 8K, in personal competition with his 37-year-old son Sgt. Harry J. Watson, Orange County Deputy Sheriff. Harry E. had the better time, but Harry J. vowed to get in better shape

for the next race.

October 20, 1992, Harry celebrated his seventieth birthday. Family and friends dined and told tales of life with Harry on board a riverboat restaurant, overlooking Balboa Bay, California.

Harry struck again on November 8, 1992. Entering the Senior Olympics, Belmont Plaza, Long Beach, California, Harry broke the record in the 50-yard free-style swimming competition, men, aged 70-74, winning the gold medal. This win qualifies him to compete in the national Senior Olympics, June 12-18, 1993, in Baton Rouge, Louisiana. Harry took another gold medal in the 100-yard free-style swimming event for men in his age group.

Tuesday evenings, Harry can be found bowling on a team with his sons and daughters-in-law in Mission Viejo. Several of the

Watson family have received honors there.

Future goals for Harry include competing with sons Harry J., 37; and Paul, 43; in a 100-yard dash and 100-yard free-style swimming race in February, 1993. This is a family event. Harry also plans to compete in Palm Springs in an attempt to qualify for more events at the national Senior Olympics.

Harry and Myrna Baker dissolved their commitment in May, 1991. These days, Harry is kissing Dr. Margreta Klassen, a psychologist at the Claremont Colleges. Margreta won three gold medals at the Long Beach Senior Olympics, breaking the record for women, ages 60-64, in the 50-yard free-style competition. The other two gold medals awarded to her were for placing first in the 100-yard and 400-yard free-style swimming events for women in her age group.

Margreta also won a gold trophy in a poetry competition organized by the World Congress of Poets, in New York City, in September, 1991. That month, she and Harry were in Munich, Germany attending Oktoberfest, following Margreta's professional presentation before the International Society for Bio-behavioral

Self Regulation.

Harry and Margreta cheered each other's achievements in these endeavors. They wish their friends similar good health and the good times that they are experiencing.





SECOND CAREERS

Jim Gamble

As a boy in East Texas, Jim Gamble loved to build model airplanes and create puppets. As a man, he gave up a successful career as an airline captain to become America's busiest puppeteer.

After his degree in aeronautical engineering, Gamble became an Air Force pilot. Serving in Europe, he had an opportunity to meet and learn from the continent's finest puppeteers.

Gamble left the military in 1966 and joined Continental Airlines. In 1983, Continental filed for bankruptcy. Gamble turned full-time to puppetry. "Contrary to public perception that a captain can go from one airline to another," he says, "you're really married to an airline by the seniority system. My 12,000 hours and captain's rating meant nothing."

Today, Gamble, a Southern California resident, and eight assistants give about 2,000 performances a year at birthday parties, school assemblies, commercial trade shows, and corporate functions.

Performances at school assemblies always carry an educational aspect, usually fostering music appreciation. His musical puppet production of Prokofiev's *Peter and the Wolf* has won national awards. Gamble built Pinocchio for the Disney organization.

While Gamble is handy in the workshop, the office is in the hands of Marty, his wife of 30 years. Their business strategy is creativity. "Now that we've identified and captured markets, our major obstacle, we concentrate on doing the very best puppetry around," Gamble says. "My puppets become characters and remain that character their whole life. They are not actors playing another part."

Gamble, who says he enjoys the independence of this new career, is dedicated: When he broke his wrist recently, he insisted that the doctor allow him free use of the thumb, index and middle fingers so he could continue performing. The fruit of his dedication is worth the trouble. He was one of two Americans invited to perform at the 1988 World Puppetry Festival in Japan. He has entertained at Vietnam refugee camps in Guam. And last July, Gamble earned the prestigious President's Award for Contribution to the Field of Puppetry, the Puppeteers of America's top national and


