

BILL CARPENTER'S FAMILY (The "flying" CARPENTERS)

Family: Spouse, former Eva M. Trahern from Sublette Ks. married 1940 (a farmeress & bookkeeper) Children, Karon K. & Billie R. ALL PILOTS (The "flying" CARPENTERS)

My interest in flying began when my parents arranged for Riley Burrows to take my sisters, Jean, June and my self up for a plane ride. After that plane ride my interests changed from trains to planes.


To finance this interest, I started by putting out 5 acres of wheat and when harvested I doubled up by taking all the wheat and seeding as many acres as it would go. And then like every thing else a crop failure and by 1931 wheat was selling on the farm in Western Kansas for nineteen cents a bushel. So aviation didn't look to bad by those standards. A deal was made whereas: for \$500.00 Riley Burrows agree to sell me the same plane I took my first ride in and supervise me on maintenance, plus flying instruction. I agreed to work for him for one year free of charge. Riley soloed me in the OX-5 powered Eagle rock in November 1931. Received my Limited Commercial license #29017 in spring of 1933 and then built up my hours to where I got my Transport License in 1934 from the U. S. Department of Commerce. I obtained my Aircraft and Engine license later. Riley Burrows had Transport license # 798.

I owned and operated several different planes, giving flying lessons to many different people and barnstorming around the mid-west. I alternated between flying and farming until the fall of 1939 when I was recommended to be Owner and Contract Operator of The Civilian Pilot Program, co-ordinate with Southwestern College at Winfield, Kansas. I was on the Faculty from 1939 until 1941. I sold the operation and was associated with Rawdon Brothers Flying Service at Wichita, Kansas. I obtained my Instrument rating and decided to go with the Airlines.

I was hired by Continental Airlines May 1, 1942. At that time I was number 26 on the pilots seniority list and when I retired 30 years later my seniority number was #3. I flew as Co-pilot for a year. Then instructed in Douglas C-47's for a year. Checking out as Captain in the spring of 1944. In the span of 30 years on the line as Co-pilot then Captain, the first plane was the Lockheed Loadstar, a crew of two pilots, one Stewardess, 14 passengers, and the gross weight was 17,500 lbs. The last and the greatest plane was the Boeing 747, flight crew of three pilots, 13 stewardess, 2 cabin attends called Director of Passenger Service, a crew of 18 total, and the total gross weight was 710,000 lbs. By this time you can see that Lockheed Loadstar wouldn't carry all the crew of the Boeing 747, not counting the 365 passengers. During my airline career I checked out on the following planes: Lockheed Loadstar, Douglas DC-3, DC-6, DC-6B, DC-7, Convair 240-340-440, Viscount, Boeing 707 series, 720B, 320C, and Boeing 747. I feel the greatest advancement made was in navigation air called I. N. S. or Internal Navigation System. The same as used by the Astronauts on going to the moon.

Upon retiring I had accumulated a little over 30,000 hours. The many times I flew over Southwestern Kansas during my airline flying and it was always interest to me. THE GARDEN-SPOT OF THE WORLD. Just a little S W of Garden City, Kansas.
