



GROWING UP WITH THE LITTLE AIRLINE THAT COULD

As we all know, the successful airline that we know now as Continental is a large blended family. This may bring to light a little family history from the smaller but noisy cousin!! The fleet in the 70's existed of Convair 600's and DC9's.

Starting with the regional carrier, Texas International was an exciting time in the early 70's, with the exception of the truly interesting "Frito Bandito" uniforms. These had followed the "Purple Era" and were on their last legs in February of 1974. That graduating class had to take what was left standing and manage until the new uniforms came out about 6 months later. This is where you began to see what a family this group would become. We worked together to find everyone the best fit and marched out armed with safety pins and needles to make them work. I was fortunate enough to have one pair of slacks, a vest and a dress...I actually had a choice when I went out, that was until one day when in the rear of the Convair, the teeth fell out of the zipper and the pants were history. Unfortunately there were two days of hopping around the Southwest left and had the copilot not have been so handy with a safety pin, I could have been in real trouble!!

It soon became evident that this can do and co operative spirit would be the norm at this airline.

As a Flight Attendant for TI, I very quickly became attached to these great gentlemen that we called our pilots. They looked out for their crews and really cared. On a short layover in a station, while trying to catch a little rest before loading passengers again, it was not unusual to wake and see that one of the guys had thoughtfully laid a blanket over the chair if it was chilly. If a passenger became a bit abusive or rowdy, all you had to do was look behind you...there they were to back you up.

I won't bore you with the complete details of growing up TI. but would like to highlight a few experiences.

THE SOUTHWEST BATTLE:

When I was in class in February of 1974, we were told that Southwest was our greatest competitor. We were to pay attention to them. A few

years later, there was a group of us selected to play a basketball game with Southwest Flight Attendants for The Big Brothers of America. Our team was doing great, and we had DeDe "Meadowlark" Snyder who was very tall hitting those baskets. The game was close, and one of our girls got the ball and ran the court..so exciting.. but she went to the wrong basket!! Oh well, it was for charity wasn't it?

THE BEST STUFF:

Often back then, the crew would get a "good letter" from a passenger. I have a few to share.

One letter was from a passenger from Dallas to Little Rock..he compared us to American at the time. It went something like this: American is a lovely lady that presents herself so well, but on short flights pulls back, on the other hand the Lady TI can take off, make breakfast, wash the dishes, and clean the kitchen all before the plane is level.

The Convairs were old when I got there, but how I loved them. It was my own world with the guys up front, we were a real team. I got a letter there as well...went like this. "I watched the hostess (that was what we were called then) work the coffee maker, it took some effort to do it, but she seemed to know how to wire it together to make it work. The galley seemed to have quirks that she could fix with a stir stick, the crowning effort was when the door wouldn't open and with one well placed kick, she maintained her composure and got us out of there.

The DC9's were a little more updated and were great to work as well, the camaraderie of the crews extended throughout the system, I just happened to love those old Convairs!

FLYING FOR PEANUTS:

Who could forget the "Peanut Fares"? A crazy name for a very successful campaign. These were the days of the "Texas Doubles" and 16 oz beers along with, you guessed it, plenty of peanuts! The flights were loaded and the trays were heavy, but somehow we didn't really notice, it was just another part of the team.

Rio Grande Valley 525 Of course we had our mascot and fearless leader of the campaign, "Mr. Peanut", a very large cardboard guy that traveled system wide promoting the fares. Having been given the dubious honor of being "Mrs. Peanut", my cardboard partner and I traveled together often. We were even celebrity guests at the horse races in Arkansas. He was a little difficult to sit next to, but I tell you, this cardboard husband thing had some merit! I could tell him what to do and never expect resistance!!

Shortly after this period of quiet travel with my cardboard husband, I had to admit to him that I had actually been seeing someone that could walk and talk on his own as I had to go out on maternity leave. During that year, things began to change as we began the process of merging Continental and Texas International. I kept up with all of the news through my friends on the line (Gary never remembered any "juicy news" to bring home!) and I will never forget a comment at a Christmas party before I returned to work. Remember the good letter about the stir sticks and kicks? A flight attendant friend was bringing me up to speed about all of the changes and she said, "We have cherries with stems! If they had only known how little it would have taken to make us happy!" You would realize the significance of this if you have ever tried to stab the last cherry in the jar to garnish a drink while knowing that you will be descending any minute!

A MEMORABLE TRIP:

Almost every trip we took in those days was special, just due to the fact that we were such a small and supportive family. Whether you were on the DC-9, or the Convair, you knew the crew, you knew their families, and you knew you were with people that cared. Even the passengers that flew from the small cities on a regular basis were family. We were on a first name basis with many, you knew all about them, even when the guppy had babies! It was a warm and wonderful time! One trip was especially memorable for me...!

I received a call one day asking if I would submit to Secret Service clearance for a charter. Of course I would I said... who is the charter? They couldn't tell me until the clearance was done, but imagine how exited I was to have Ronald Reagan stroll onto the Convair!

It was a four day trip through Texas with stops off and on all day long. The plane was full, mostly press, but some Secret Service, Mr. Reagan and "Little Ronnie". The way the Convair was configured, the luggage racks for carry on were up front in the entry way, this is where the press stowed all of their equipment. At each stop, the procedure was for the agent in the cockpit to stand with me at the top of the stairs and another go down first to give the all clear to exit the aircraft. Of course the press all wanted to be the first ones off and were like fighting back a waterfall. At one stop, as soon as the stairs were down, a press member charged forward knocking me backwards into the agent in the cockpit, I am sure that the security was a little less than expected as he and I sprawled across the radio rack. Being the sympathetic creatures they are, the rest of the press crew raced down the stairs, passing us by like we didn't exist. As we struggled to get up, one kind man stopped to help...Mr. Reagan. He refused to go down the stairs until he made sure that we were okay. As the trip progressed, the majority of the plane kept me hopping wanting this or that or more ice or less ice, and on and on and on, but Mr. Reagan had maybe a glass of water a couple of times in four days and always said, "when you have time" and "Thank you". The only time he really asked for anything was after a stop in Abilene for a Pancake Supper. After take off, he came back to the galley. I commented on the good turn out that he had there and asked about his supper, he closed the curtain, looked around, and said, "Don't tell anyone, but those were the worst pancakes I have ever had in my life, do you have any Alka Seltzer on board?"

He was a very kind and real man and I was honored to have been selected for that trip.

AND MOVING ON:

I could ramble on for days with all of the memories I have of the great people that made up "The Little Airline That Could", it was a wonderful time. When I look at the great airline that we have built together today, I am proud to say that I was there, and I am proud of the wonderful blended family we have become. TI, Continental, Frontier, Peoples, New York Air, Pioneer, and all that have come together have created a new family, though larger, just as caring. May all of the memories blend now into one big scrapbook!

Greetings Members:

I have come across a couple of tidbits I would like to pass along to the group that is those who are eligible to purchase off line passes.

Alaska/Horizon Airline has recently changed to the ZED, (Zonal Employee Discount) fares for their online travel. They previously were on Service Charge Passes.

This leaves only Southwest with a Service Charge Pass agreement that I'm aware of.

Along those lines I would like to emphasize that the Zonals are based on mileage **per segment** plus tax of course so should you be using one and have to make an aircraft change enroute you will be charged for 2 segments and the cost can really add up.

The good thing about Zonals is that any unused portions or coupons are completely refundable and you can now access the Refund Form through coair.com and save a trip to the airport ticket counter.

Log onto coair.com and on the home page across the top from Powered by Goggle, put your cursor on **Pass Travel** and then down to **Other Airline Information**. Click on this link and the last item under **Information** will be "OA (for other airline) Ticket Refund Form." Print out and fill in this form and mail to the address shown along with your unused coupons and the refund will be credited to or mailed to you.

She was born July 26, 1926, in Sabinal, Texas, to the late Roy and Ila Deason Word.



Hal Wrightson was a natural athlete. He played football at the University of Minnesota under the coaching of the legendary Bernie Bierman. Hal's position was right half back or as he said "Blocking Back".

I believe his aviation cadet class was 41-D at Randolph Field, Texas. Randolph was the predecessor to the Airforce Academy. Hal instructed at Randolph and during WW-II flew 16 B-29 missions over Japan while based on Tinian in the Mariana Islands. On one mission his aircraft was hit by Flack making it unable to close the bomb bay doors. Hal was forced to land on Iwo Jima for fuel and to wire the doors closed.

Hal also participated in the show-of-force flyover at the time of Mac Arthur's signing of articles of surrender by the Japanese on the deck of the "MISSOURI" anchored in Tokyo Bay.

As you know Hal was liked and respected by all of us. I played golf with him long ago. He usually shot in the very low eighties. Heaven Rest Him.

Hal grew up during the depression era in St. Paul, MN. He played running back on the NCAA Championship football teams at the U. of Minnesota 1934-1936.

Graduating from the U. of Minnesota, with double majors in meteorology and aeronautical engineering, Hal first worked as a meteorology and aeronautical engineering, Hal first worked as a meteorologist in Chicago, IL. Then, for WWII, he enlisted in the Army Air corps. He became a decorated B-29 commander with his last base being on the Pacific island of Tinian. He was part of the final air assaults on Tokyo, making several long range bombing runs that led to Japan's surrender. After his military service in 1945, Hal became a commercial pilot for Continental airlines for whom he flew for the next 30 years. Flying every type of aircraft from the beginning biplanes to trans Pacific flights in the sophisticated tri-jet DC-10, he retired in 1975 with over 37,000 accident free flight hours-most of which were in command.
